Transportation:

Taxi service to and from Vancouver International Airport (YVR) is recommended, and takes roughly 25-30 minutes.

Several major bus lines (http://translink.ca) serve the UBC campus, and arrive and depart at the UBC Exchange, a short walk south on Wesbrook Mall from Chancellor Boulevard. Bus line #68 is a campus-only shuttle that travels between Northwest Marine Drive (near to Green College) and the UBC Exchange. The best bus for the Wolf & Hound Pub is the #9 or #99.
